



# FIRE STATION

The Streator Fire Department operates out of a single station located at 108 North Wasson Street in Streator, Illinois. The 14,000 square foot building was constructed in 2005 and houses all Administrative offices, all Fire and EMS apparatus, and living quarters for all on-duty personnel. The location of the fire station in the center of the city provides the SFD with quick access to all locations in the city limits and the surrounding area. In 2025, we celebrated the 20th year in our facility.



# PERFORMANCE

## RESPONSE TIMES

Response times are key to the mitigation of any emergency. With a staffed and centrally located fire station, Streator Fire units are able to respond to emergencies in a quick manner. The fire department conducts training daily to reinforce our knowledge of our response district. An important note, not every request for service requires an emergency response. The use of lights and sirens increases risk to the public and responders. In the interest of safety, the department has begun responding to many scenes non-emergent (no lights or sirens). These changes have begun to reflect in our on scene times.

## TOTAL TRANSPORTS

The Streator Fire Department began providing ambulance service to Streator and the surrounding areas in October 2022. Since then, the number of patients transported has increased each year.

Each year, the Streator Fire Department monitors the amount of value saved from firefighting efforts. Fire prevention efforts for higher value commercial properties should help the amount of fire loss year over year.

## FIRE CONTAINMENT

The Streator Fire Department measures the effectiveness of firefighting tactics with statistics based on fire containment. While the data may vary based on the type and conditions of each fire, this metric provides a worthy measure of performance.

## OVERLAPPING CALLS

The Streator Fire Department began monitoring the number of overlapping calls in 2023. An overlapping call is the number of times an ambulance is requested while another ambulance is already on a call. By tracking this number, the goal has been to decrease the number of times that all ambulances are tied up on calls. With two fully staffed ambulances, overlapping calls takes both ambulances out of service and leaves the city without coverage for a time. In the past 2 years, overlapping call numbers have decreased to 24%. And in 2025, our overlap percentage is exactly the same as 2024.

# CULTURE OF EXCELLENCE IN RESUSCITATION

Out of hospital cardiac arrest (OHCA) is one of the most critical calls to which the Streator Fire Department responds. An OHCA is defined as any event in which an individual's heart stops beating in a manner that is compatible with sustained life outside of the medical setting. The goal of all emergency medical crews is to achieve a Return Of Spontaneous Circulation (ROSC). The

SFD Culture of Excellence program doesn't only strive to achieve ROSC but also aims to provide patients with the highest possible quality of life with a neurologically intact discharge from the hospital. The national average for achieving ROSC in the field is 24% and the national average for a neurologically intact survival is 9%.

All data is filtered to remove situations where bystanders did CPR that was not indicated, the patient's injuries or illness were inconsistent with life, the patient had a do not resuscitate order, or if there was a duplicate report.

In 2025 the Streator Fire Department responded to 17 OHCA and achieved ROSC on 53% of those cases. This includes calls that are in the unincorporated areas of Streator primarily staffed by Reading Fire Protection District. Within the incorporated city limits of Streator, the Fire Department responded to 12 OHCA and achieved a ROSC on 58% of those cases. This is more than twice the national average.

In 2025 the Streator Fire Department achieved a neurologically intact discharge on 18% in its response area. This is twice the national average.



# FIRE PREVENTION/COMMUNITY RISK REDUCTION

## SMOKE ALARM INSTALLATION WITH AMERICAN RED CROSS

The Streator Fire Safety Initiative was started in 2016. In the 9 years since the program's inception, a total of 3,531 smoke alarms have been installed in Streator and the surrounding area. The American Red Cross continues to be an outstanding partner with the Home Fire Campaign. All smoke alarms have been provided by the Red Cross free of charge.

## COMMUNITY OUTREACH


The Streator Fire Department has continued in it's mission of public education through station tours, school visits, and community outreach. Over 1,000 fire prevention packets were handed out to K-4th graders in the Streator community. A special Thank You to Theresa Solon-Wargo State Farm for assistance in helping to reach our pre-school community as well!



## BUSINESS INSPECTION/PREPLANNING PROGRAM

The Streator Fire Department commercial business inspection program began in 2016. Since then, Streator Fire crews have routinely inspected all public buildings in Streator to look for potential fire hazards and fire code issues. With this hands on approach, the department has noticed a sharp decrease in avoidable commercial fires.

In addition to fire code inspections, Streator Firefighters have also been to preplanning every commercial business in Streator. These preplans will provide the department with the ability to prepare for any major event that may occur in a commercial building. The preplans also give the department an opportunity to interact with business owners to ask about their needs and answer any questions. Streator Fire utilizes FlowMSP software (developed in Streator) to document all photos and preplan information for future use. All information gathered remains strictly in house and is available on all fire apparatus at the touch of a button.

## FIRE INVESTIGATIONS

In 2024, the Streator Fire Department completed 67 fire inspection reports. Any call with active fire involvement is investigated by the Streator Fire Department to determine the origin and cause of the fire. Data from these fire investigations is compiled to determine trends in the cause(s) of fire. The Streator Fire Department has eight certified fire investigators on staff.

# TRAINING

Training remains the foundation of our performance. Using the Streator Public Safety Training Complex and other infrastructure like the Streator Incubator we hosted 5 outside classes to 139 students from 75 different police, fire, and other government agencies in 2025. Partnerships like this allow agencies to receive this training close to home and provide an opportunity for individuals from different backgrounds to work together as they might in a larger emergency.

Classes hosted include:

- Basic Operations Firefighter (BOF) – 37 Students / 27 Fire Departments
- Active Shooter Incident Management (ASIM) – 23 Students / 13 Police & Fire Depts
- School Safety & Violent Event Incident Management (SSAVEIM) – 41 Students / 29 Schools, Police & Fire Departments
- Advanced Fire Officer (AdFO) – 25 Students / 15 Fire Departments
- First Due for Fire Alarms – 13 Students / 4 Fire Departments

In addition to training outside the Streator Fire Department, all Streator Firefighters complete the following training on an annual basis:

- American Heart Association Basic Life Support
- EMS Continuing Education (25 Hours)
- Driver Training (12 Hours)
- Live Fire Training and Facility Training (18 Hours)
- Hazardous Materials Training (6 Hours)
- Company Training (192 Hours)
- Officer Training [Officers Only] (12 Hours)



# SIGNIFICANT EVENTS OF 2025

**January 7, 2025**

43 Stanton Place - Rescue/House Fire

On January 7, 2025, the Streator Fire Department was called to 43 Stanton Place for a reported house on fire with occupants trapped inside by the smoke. Fire department units quickly arrived on scene and were able to locate the occupants in a window in the rear of the home. Firefighters used a ladder to rescue the residents from the home. At the same time, firefighters entered the smoke-filled home with hoselines to extinguish the fire. It was later discovered that the occupants of the home were sleeping with a closed door when the fire started and that the closed door saved both lives. The occupants were treated for smoke inhalation and released. Unfortunately, the three family dogs perished from smoke inhalation.
